

Royal Lakes Wetlands Restoration

In 2019, the plan submitted to the **WWAG** to restore the wetlands on the **Royal Lakes W.A.** was approved. Since the shutdown for COVID and the red tape involved in getting a cultural resources review completed the project has been on hold.

The review was finally completed and the **Wanapum Tribe** was not interested in the review so finally something is starting to happen. **WDFW** is about to have a signed contract with an outside vendor to remove the Russian olive trees on the site. Once that is completed WDFW folks will spray the area with a herbicide this Fall and next Spring. With that done we can start working on the nesting cover plantings and shrubs for winter survival.

The funding for this is through donations from **Col. Thomas M. O'Dell** to the **Columbia Basin Pheasants** Forever Chapter. This will be a big project done over couple of years and volunteers will be needed so keep your ears open for a chance to help.





Help Carry On Vasiliy Baranyuk's Important Work



Conserving our Shared Resource



The Wrangel Island snow goose population is an important component of the Pacific Northwest ecosystem and a valuable resource for the hunting and viewing public. International cooperation on this population began back in 1974 (when the population was near extinction) and continued unabated through the Cold War, until 2022. The population survived in the past as a result of cooperative international efforts throughout its range and has been at healthy levels for the last decade.

Currently, all official communication between our countries has ceased. Because of this, no one monitored or surveyed the nesting area during the summer of 2023. I am a biologist who has devoted four decades studying Wrangel Island ecosystems, and in particular the snow goose population. I have been a private researcher for 10 years now and represent people-to-people diplomacy for this population shared by our countries.

I am organizing an expedition to the nesting area in 2024 and am appealing to all interested non-governmental organizations and individuals to sponsor this event. The results of the research will be published in local newspapers and presented by me in a series of public lectures during the winter of 2024-25.

WA Legislative Report

Editor's Note: This article is written entirely by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington. The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter because of **WWA's** membership in Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). **WWC** is a member organization of **HHC**. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

Washington is becoming California or Hawaii for Gunowners

This last session was a nightmare for Washington gun owners. We are becoming as draconian as California or maybe as bad as Hawaii. While I do this, I have to stress that the HHC is NOT a Second Amendment organization, it is a hunting-rights organization and only a hunting-rights organization. That is how it is set up under its IRS Charter and its Articles of Incorporation. We cannot lead the charge on Second Amendment issues, we follow the Second Amendment organizations. The Second Amendment organizations follow the lead of the HHC on hunting issues. This leads to legislative victories, where we do not step on each other's toes. In fact, in an issue of Gun Owners Action League, a reader asked why they never commented on hunting issues, and the answer was, Title 77 (RCW for hunting issue), was under the purview of the HHC. Mark **Pidgeon** writes this story with no affiliation to the **HHC**.

I am only covering the most egregious bill of this issue, ESHB 2118, and it is bad beyond words. This bill will put mom & pop gun stores out of business with the draconian regulations and requirements and drive the price of guns up in this state. I will cover only the major highlights of this bill.

Dealer Record Keeping.

Dealers must make a true record of every pistol or semiautomatic assault rifle sold in a book kept for record-keeping purposes, which must be personally signed by the purchaser and person making the sale in the presence of each other. Each entry must note the date of sale; the caliber, make, model, and manufacturer's number of the weapon; the name, address, occupation, and place of birth of the purchaser; and a statement signed by the purchaser that

they are not ineligible under state or federal law to possess a firearm. The dealer must retain the transfer record for six years. Dealers must transmit the information from the President, Hunters Heritage Council firearm transfer application to the Washington State Patrol firearms background check program. The dealer must retain the original application for six years. Violations of State Firearms Laws. Your firearms purchases are going to the state patrol!

> Any violation of any provision of the chapter of state law regulating firearms constitutes a misdemeanor, except as otherwise provided.

Dealer Business Security.

Dealer business locations must be secured with the following features:

- bars or grates, security screens, or commercial grade metal doors that are designed to prevent unauthorized entry and which must be installed on each exterior door and window; and
- a security alarm system that is properly installed and maintained in good condition; monitored by a remote central station that can contact law enforcement; capable of real-time monitoring of exterior doors and windows, and firearm storage areas; and equipped with detectors that can perceive entry, motion, and sound.

Dealer Firearm Storage.

During business hours, dealers must secure each firearm in a manner that prevents a customer or other member of the public from accessing or using the firearm, except when the firearm is being shown to a customer, repaired, or worked on. Locked containers and display cases satisfy this requirement.

Outside business hours, firearms must be secured: (1) on the dealer's business premises in a locked fireproof safe or vault; (2) in a room or building that meets the physical security and alarm system requirements for firearm dealer business locations; or (3) in a secured and locked area under the dealer's control while the dealer is conducting business at a temporary location.

Dealer Insurance.

Dealers must carry a general liability insurance policy providing at least \$1 million in coverage per incident. This potion alone will drive some dealers out of business as they will not be able to afford the insurance premiums.

Dealer Business Surveillance.

Dealers must ensure their business location is monitored by a digital video surveillance system that:

- clearly records images and, inside the premises, audio;
- has cameras permanently mounted in a fixed location that can clearly record activity in all areas where video monitoring is required and reasonably produce recordings that allow for the clear identification of any
- monitors: (1) interior views of all exterior doors, windows, and any other entries or exits; (2) all areas where firearms are displayed; and (3) all points of sale, sufficient to identify the parties involved in the transaction;
- is capable of recording 24 hours per day at a frame rate of no less than 15 frames per second, and which either continuously records or uses motion sensors to activate recording, subject to the requirement that motionactivated recording must remain active for at least 15 seconds after motion ceases to be detected;
- stores recordings in a manner to protect the recording from tampering, unauthorized
- access or use, or theft;
- maintains recordings of areas where firearms are displayed and points of sale for a minimum of 90 days, and maintains recordings of interior views of exterior doors, windows, and any other entries or exits for a minimum of 45 days;
- records images that clearly and accurately display the date and time; and
- provide notice to the licensee of any interruption or failure of the surveillance system or recording storage.

This bill will raise gun and ammo prices. When the lawsuit comes about, every one of us needs to dig in our pockets and WDFW will use drones for sandhill crane kick in to fight this travesty of justice. It invades your and my privacy. When you go into a gun store you will be video recorded, when you buy a firearm, you will be video recorded purchasing that gun. This is beyond terrible, and it must be fought!

WDFW seeks public input on Theler Wetlands restoration project

I recently read an article that focused on salmon restoration and realized the importance of how the restoration of one project complements the environment of the waterfowl hunter as well. There is a project underway to seek the public's opinion on restoring a few acres of the Mary E. Theler Wetlands Nature Preserve in Mason County. It is located in Lower Hood Canal near Belfair. The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and Hood Canal Salmon Enhancement Group (HCSEG) primary focus is salmon restoration, but they acknowledge that the effort complements surrounding habitats such as waterfowl.

As a new waterfowl hunter, I found this intriguing. Furthermore, the partnership between the government and school districts helps in mentoring the next generation of

waterfowl hunters. **WDFW Wildlife Area Manager Katie Laushman** is quoted as saying, "We appreciate the partnership with the school district and community for wetland protection and education and are proud to steward these important conservation lands that offer a variety of recreational options".

"The Union River Unit provides many opportunities, including hiking, wildlife viewing, fishing, and a hand boat launch that can be used for accessing waterfowl hunting blinds."

The Hunter's Table

The Pickings of a Goose

Ever wonder what should a hunter do with the little bit of meat left on the bones after dressing the animal? Being an ethical hunter and my first Canadian goose, I want to use as much of the animal for consumption as possible. One of the ways that I fulfill my ethical desire is to make a broth out of the bones with the meat attached. Why not? Waterfowl has a lot of healthy nutrients and no man-made chemicals injected into it. It is easy! In this section of **The Hunters Table** I will share with you how I achieved a versatile meal from the carcass to plate. The results will be a broth, the separated meat, and a bit of your imagination. Let's begin.

For the broth you will need the four ingredients below. Gather seasoning and fill a deep pot to a safe level and simmer for about 2-3 hours. This should separate the connective tissue from the bones making it easy to pull it off the bones.

Ingredients:

- 1-2 Bay leaves
- Kosher salt. Enough to make the water salt
- Small hand full of whole black peppercorns

After, remove the carcass and carefully peel and pick away the meat and place it in a bowl for storage. Drain the broth through the colander and fill up some glass bottle. The broth will need to cool down for the food sediments separate. You can you a coffe filter if you'd like. I like to let it cool and remove the clear fluid into a clear bottle. Scrap the rest.

The uses for these two main ingredients are endless and limited to your imagination. For the broth: soup, rice, gravy/sauces, flavoring, water replacement where animal protein can complement. For the meat: pulled goose/duck, stir fry, sloppy joe sandwich, duck/goose fajita, to name a few.

The pictured dish has only four ingredients and took a few minutes to make and makes a very good leftover dish or a midnight snack. They are: turmeric seasoned rice, cherry tomatoes, goose picking, and some seasoning. I think I used Jamaican jerk seasoning.

Until next time, hunt and eat well!




Arlan Glen Hackett
