

I have been travelling since June 20th with my bride, **Teresa Coffey.** Initially we spent three (3) days driving south to the Santa Barbara area to visit with my parents. I finally received the list of **Migratory Bird Authorization** permits sold by **WDFW.** There were 142,000 permits issued between 2017- 2019. I estimate there are 40,000+ names that **WWA** can canvas for new memberships. As it stands now **WWA** Represents less than 1 percent of waterfowlers licensed in this state — check my math. This is not acceptable. Yes this does sound a little negative, but we will keep getting better. We are getting younger men and women involved, and that is a good thing. We will persevere.

Chapter Work Parties

The state wide COVID-19 restrictions have had an impact on the chapter's activities. With the reopening of state lands including Wildlife Areas, we are in the planning and scheduling mode for the continuation of our yearly activities. These outdoor activities include blind maintenance and cleanup, youth and veterans hunts and our annual **Farmed Island Tour.** As schedules are established, we'll keep everyone posted.

Island Unit Advisory Group

The Island Unit Advisory Group is part of WDFW's habit restoration initiative. The Island Unit or better known to waterfowl hunters as the "Farmed Island" is a part of the Skagit Wildlife Area. As many of you are aware the island has been actively farmed since the 1950s to provide enhanced winter forage for waterfowl.

The Island Unit Advisory Group provides feedback to WDFW's Alternatives Analysis -- a planning tool used to evaluate a range of choices relative to a set of common criteria. WDFW's plan is to assess four (4) options that range from no restoration to restoring all 268 acres. WDFW will evaluate options based on state requirements and

policies, as well as community values and input from the advisory group and the public.

The advisory team has met on three (3) occasions. Two (2) of the meetings took place this year. WDFW has developed a draft of the common criteria that will be used to evaluate the four (4) options. This criteria was recently sent to advisory group members.

wwa has four (4)
members on the Advisory Group
including Reb Broker, James Ono,
Darrell Tawes and Rick Billieu.
wwa members have all provided
feedback to wDFW in regard to
the criteria. Copies of the criteria
can be made available to any
wwa members. There are
additional meetings and a public

open house planned this year. As additional decisions that affect the future of the **Farmed Island** are made, **WWA** advisory group members will keep you informed.

If you have not renewed your WWA membership, you can renew on-line at www.waduck.org or at the next chapter meeting. The Northwest Chapter usually meets on the second Tuesday each month at the Conway Fire Station starting at 7 pm. Raffle at the end of each meeting. See you there and bring a friend.



WA Legislative Report

[Editor's Note: WWA is a voting member of the Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of the Hunter's Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington].

Hunters Heritage Council Pre-Primary Endorsements

This story is written entirely by the **Hunters Heritage Council (HHC). WWA** had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter because of **WWA's** membership in **Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC).** The endorsements of the candidates are entirely those of the **HHC.**

HHC is NOT a Republican organization, we support members of both parties. Our highest honor, the HHC Hall of Fame, we have inducted 16 people, 10 elected officials and six (6) hunting activist super heroes. Of those 10 elected officials, five (5) were Democrats and five (5) were Republicans, an even 50%-50% mix. Every year when we select our "Legislator of the Year" award, we make sure that we have representation from all four (4) caucuses — House and Senate Democratic Caucuses and the House and Senate Republican Caucuses.

It should also be noted that the HHC is not a gunrights organization. We are a hunting-rights organization! We lobby and electioneer for hunting issues. That doesn't mean we don't think that the Second Amendment isn't important, but there are plenty of outstanding gun-rights groups like the NRA, the Citizens Committee to Keep and Bear Arms (CCRKBA), Gun Owners Action League—Washington (GOAL), and Gun Owners of America (GOA) just to name a few. It is their job the advocate for Second Amendment candidates. In fact, in Olympia, the HHC has an unwritten agreement with the gun groups: on hunting issues the HHC takes the lead on those issues; and on the Second Amendment issues we follow the gun groups lead. This keeps unity in the ranks and builds legislative victories.

The following list was approved by the **Board of Directors of the HHC**. Some are Hall of Fame **HHC** members like **Brian Blake**, **Dean Takko**, **Joel Kretz**, and

Mark Schoesler. Others are *Legislator of the Year* recipients like Lynda Wilson, Jacquelin Maycumber, JT Wilcox, Jim Walsh, and Larry Hoff. We have many first-time endorsements on the list too. It is critical that every hunter get out and vote this primary.

One candidate I want to highlight is Connie
Beauvais. She is running against Senator Kevin Van De
Wege in the 24th Legislative District, encompassing most
of the Olympic Peninsula, including all of Clallam and
Jefferson counties and most of Grays Harbor County. This
race is of the utmost importance. Connie is an outstanding
candidate, and she is running a great race against a tough
opponent.

Senator Van De Wege is the most anti-hunting senator in the state senate, and unfortunately he wields considerable power on hunting/fishing issues as Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee. If we could beat him this election cycle, it would be a major win for "hunters and fishers" statewide! The commercial fleets are supporting Connie, so are the charter boat operators, and there are a coalition of other groups too. The HHC Political Action Committee (PAC) has already contributed the pre-primary maximum of \$1,000 to her campaign. Her website is https://connieforsenate.com/

Ducks Plant Highland Lakes

aka Experimental Evidence of Dispersal of Invasive Cyprinid Eggs Inside Migratory Waterfowl

Abstract

Fish have somehow colonized isolated water bodies all over the world without human assistance. It has long been speculated that these colonization events are assisted by waterbirds, transporting fish eggs attached to their feet and feathers, yet empirical support for this is lacking. Recently, it was suggested that **endozoochory** (i.e., internal transport within the gut) might play a more important role, but only highly resistant diapause eggs of killifish have been found to survive passage through waterbird guts.

Here, we performed a controlled feeding experiment, where developing eggs of two cosmopolitan, invasive cyprinids (common carp, Prussian carp) were fed to captive mallards. Live embryos of both species were retrieved from fresh feces and survived beyond hatching. Our study identifies an overlooked dispersal mechanism in fish, providing evidence for bird-mediated dispersal ability of soft-membraned eggs undergoing active development.

Only 0.2% of ingested eggs survived gut passage, yet, given the abundance, diet, and movements of ducks in nature, our results have major implications for biodiversity conservation and invasion dynamics in freshwater ecosystems.

How organisms are able to overcome barriers to dispersal is a central question in biology (1). Dispersal events are key to gene flow, distribution ranges, metapopulation dynamics, speciation, and invasiveness (2). Among these, long-distance dispersal events are generally

rare and stochastic (1), but have major influence over species range expansions (3). It is especially intriguing how aquatic organisms move across an inhospitable terrestrial matrix between river catchments (4). Fish are often able to colonize remote lakes or ponds, but suggested mechanisms have gained little empirical support (5, 6).

It has been speculated that the most likely dispersal mechanism for fish over dry land is the external transport of eggs on the feathers or feet of waterbirds (5). Nonetheless, there is almost no evidence for this (7), calling for the investigation of alternative mechanisms that allow fish to disperse to isolated waterbodies.

An ability to disperse inside terrestrial vertebrates following ingestion **(endozoochory)** is one such mechanism. Endozoochory by waterbirds has been demonstrated for a range of aquatic invertebrates, including insect larvae (8), as well as soft plant parts and seeds (92–11).

A recent study found that diapaused eggs of annual killifish survive passing the gut of **coscoroba swans** (6). That study provided the first evidence that endozoochory might play a role in the long-distance dispersal of vertebrates.

However, killifish possess adaptations that enable them to survive hostile environments. Killifish zygotes often enter diapause for years during periodic droughts in their ephemeral habitats, while the highly specialized chorionic membrane isolates the embryo and allows it to survive anoxia, hypersalinity, or desiccation (12).

The water permeability of diapausing embryos can be orders of magnitude lower than that of other teleost fishes, while the enveloping cell layer acts as a highly efficient barrier to ion exchange (12).

It is therefore not so surprising that these resistant eggs were able to survive the acidic, anoxic environment in the waterfowl digestive tract, but the enveloping cell layer of annual killifishes is unique among teleost fish (12). Thus, it remains to be determined whether endozoochory can be a dispersal mechanism in soft-membraned eggs found in the overwhelming majority of freshwater fish.

The Duck, the Eagle, and the Rockfish

One morning a few years ago I went duck hunting with a buddy at the **Samish Unit of the Skagit Wildlife Area**. It was forecast to be a windy day, and we set up before dawn in a sheet water pond in a field with little cover nearby. Things started out great with the sounds and silhouettes of widgeon filling the dark sky as we arranged our decoys and got hidden. By shooting time most of the ducks had flown out to the bay, but a few mallards did come in.

As the day got lighter, we realized that we were not the only hunters in the fields that day: northern harriers glided around; raucous ravens let their presence be known; a short-eared owl flew by noiselessly; and majestic bald eagles soared overhead. In a little while a single mallard paid us a visit, and I thought I missed an easy shot, but my partner said he thought the bird went down a couple of fields away.

Shortly thereafter an eagle flew right over us and dropped something from its talons. It hit the ground with a thud not 20 yards from us. After a while I went over to see what the eagle dropped and can you believe that there lay a 14 inch copper rockfish, fresh as a daisy! No damage at all except for a couple of small puncture wounds (talons and beak).

We added it to our bag, and that night we enjoyed it for dinner steamed the Asian way. As we left the hunting area we walked over to where my partner thought the hit mallard had landed. The dog was very intrigued in the area, and we found a few duck feathers, but no duck.

My story, and I'm sticking to it, is that the eagle traded us a rockfish for a duck!

WDFW closes Irving Lawson Access Area For Public Safety Reasons

June 25, 2020

OLYMPIA – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is temporarily closing the Irving Lawson Access Area in Snohomish County. The 12-acre site on the Snohomish River will be closed through December 25, 2020.

WDFW staff have seen increased illegal trash dumping and damage to natural resources at the 12-acre site, and it has become a public safety risk.

"Water access areas provide important public recreation opportunities, but this site has seen a dramatic

increase in illegal activity," said **Fenner Yarborough, WDFW North Puget Sound Wildlife Program Manager.** "We need to make it a safer place for visitors and our community and to protect valuable habitat."

WDFW restricts campfires in E WA

July 1, 2020

SPOKANE – WDFW will restrict campfires and other activities on department-managed lands in Eastern Washington beginning July 1 to help reduce the risk of fire on state wildlife areas and water access areas.

Cynthia Wilkerson, WDFW Lands Division Manager said the threat of wildfires and smoke is even greater this year given the compromised health of those with the COVID -19 virus. The ongoing pandemic also puts firefighters at a greater risk to respond to human-caused wildfires, she said.

Firearm Use — Except for Legal Hunting — Prohibited

A temporary restriction on firearm use also starts Wednesday, July 1 on **WDFW-managed lands.** Target shooting and other gun use will be prohibited, but discharge of a firearm for legal hunting will still be permitted. Overall, the emergency order that imposes restrictions east of the Cascades prohibits:

- Fires or campfires, including those in fire rings. Personal camp stoves and lanterns fueled by propane, liquid petroleum, or liquid petroleum gas are allowed.
- Smoking, except in an enclosed vehicle.
- Welding and operating chainsaws, including the use of an acetylene torch or other open flame.
- Operating a motor vehicle away from developed roads.
 Parking is permitted within designated parking areas,
 including developed campgrounds and trailheads; and in
 areas without vegetation that are within 10 feet of
 roadways.

Baker Lake to Open for Sockeye

Effective date: July 18 through Sept. 7, 2020.

Location: (Whatcom County) Catch Record Code 825

Rule: Daily limit two (2) sockeye. Min. size 18". Anglers may fish with two poles with a two-pole endorsement. Each angler aboard a vessel may deploy salmon angling gear until the daily salmon limit for all anglers aboard has been achieved.

If lake escapement — 1,500 sockeye remain in the lake for natural spawning — appears to be in jeopardy the lake fishery \mathbf{may} be \mathbf{closed} .

RRGC Wood Duck Box Program

Some History of the RRGC Nesting Box Program

We have accomplished performing the annual maintenance of all 474 nesting boxes that were available for wood ducks last nesting season. We have replaced some of those boxes that have reached the end of their life with boxes built by youth at the Sportsman Show or Kids Duck Day, and by students at Libby Middle School or Homeschool students.

The data collected during the effort shows 56.5 % of boxes were used by wood ducks, 86 boxes were used by Western Screech Owls, cooperative banding with **WDFW** installed 17 new bands on owls and had 24 owls recaptured having been banded in previous years.

There were 186 nest boxes that had successful hatching of ducklings evidenced by us counting 1214 membranes. We believe this number is a very conservative estimate of the actual number of ducklings that were hatched and jumped from the nest boxes. The reason we feel the number is lower than actual is because many membranes are "lost" between the hatch and when the box cleaning is performed months later.

Now that all the boxes are ready for hens, we will start to survey boxes for banding efforts. A few selected checks indicate the early nesting activities have started.

In one box checked on March 22, 2020 we found and recaptured a hen sitting on 10 eggs. This hen is a banded hen that has returned to this same box or adjacent boxes since 2016 when she was first banded. Additionally we had deployed a geo-locator on this hen last year on April 23, 2019. Her nest hatched out and jumped from the box on May 19, 2019.

Apparently the ducklings perished and she re-nested in the same nest box which jumped on July 15, 2019. The geo-locator has been recovered/ removed to download the mini data logger data and we will report on the migration data after the data is processed and analyzed. We are hopeful that we will recover more of the 16 geo-locators that were deployed last spring when we get further into the nesting season.




TREASURER'S REPORT
