

Ridgefield NWR Youth Hunt 10/31/20

Our chapter provided a **WWA** logo'd **Buck Gardner Double Nasty** hen mallard call; a **WWA** logo'd whistle with lanyard; and a blind bag and a box of shells to each Youth participating in our annual October Youth Shoot at the **Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge (NWR).** Due to Covid restrictions, we dropped off the gear and let the Refuge hand out the \$75 worth of gifts for each youth. No BBQ was provided per agreement due to the virus.

Refuge Assistant Complex Manger Eric Anderson indicated there were 19 reservations issued with 12 reservation holders showing up. There were 14 youth hunters and 3 youth observers. Adults accompanying the youth were allowed to join in the hunt starting at noon. There was a combined total of 25 hunters taking 35 ducks and 5 geese for the day!

Rare Hybrid

Member **Dion Hess** hunted the **Ridgefield NWR** a few weeks ago taking blind #3 at the 10 am walk-on draw. His party took 12 ducks one of which was a rare mallard/pintail hybrid (see photo below). Refuge check station operator **Dave Lescalleet** rarely sees these — maybe one every couple of years. "Lucky Dog" **Dion** was also able to harvest a Eurasian widgeon this season!

Moses Lake Chapter News

There are a lot of waterfowl in the area, but with the warm weather and lots of rain there is also water everywhere. If you can find a spot being used by ducks and/ or geese, the chances are good you will be successful!

Winchester Habitat Project

With a \$500 donation from the Moses Lake Chapter and a matching \$500 from the Seattle Chapter, which were used to leverage North American Wetlands Conservation Act (NAWCA) funds, shrubs were purchased to complete this 300 acre WDFW habitat project. This project is located North of the Winchester Refuge and on the East and West side of the Winchester Wasteway.



WWA member Steve Page, who with his wife, Debbie, owns Midnight Valley Labradors in Paulsbo, WA got in some "Feast" hunting with WWA BOD member and Potholes guide, Bruce Feagan, and WWA member Jeff Waltz with 21 "nothing but mallards" on Saturday, December 19th. An extra bonus for Steve was watching his British Labrador, Kiera, retrieve them all!!! Sunday was "famine" — only 7 ducks for the same 3 guns.

Do you know the difference between British Labs and English Labs? Call Steve or Debbie for the answer!

The shrubs are part of the landscaping for nesting cover around the ponds which have been re-excavated and the blow-in sand removed. This is a **WA Duck Stamp & Print Project** for the <u>second</u> time. These ponds were the first Stamp & Print project in the WA State 25 years ago and were highly productive! Hopefully they will be productive again for both hunting and waterfowl reproduction.

This is an example of your **Migratory Waterfowl** "**Duck" Stamp** funds at work and demonstrates what can be accomplished when local donation are used to leverage funds from other sources, including national grants.

According to **Sean Dougherty, WDFW District Biologist** based out of Ephrata, WA, as of January 8, 2021:
"Excavations are essentially complete, grasses and forbs have been seeded, [and] we are gearing up to start removing *Russian* olive trees from about 50 acres of wetlands in the next month, and shrubs will all be planted by the end of February. All told there is going to be about 300 acres that we have improved for migrating and breeding waterfowl, using about \$700k funds from **WA Duck Stamp**, \$200k from **federal NAWCA** (2 grants), and another ~\$25k in partner match (including **WWA** and **DU**)."


Spokane Chapter News

WWA Legislative News

WA Legislative Report

[Editor's Note:] This article is written entirely by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington. The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter because of WWA's membership in Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council.

This session became a lot tougher because we lost two of our best friends in the last election in Representative Brian Blake and Senator Dean Takko. Both were initial class inductees into the Hunters Heritage Council's Hall of Fame, our organization's highest honor. They both won Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation's highest honor, their Honorary Lifetime Member Award. I have been President of the Hunters Heritage Council for 10 years, and both these fine legislators have been HHC's "Legislator of the Year" every year that I have been President. It is hard to lose that caliber of legislators. Both Brian and Dean are men of impeccable character and have been superheroes for the hunting community.

More importantly though, the real power, where it be in Olympia or Washington, DC, is the committee chairmanships. Representative **Blake** chaired the most important committee to hunters in the state house — the **House Natural Resources Committee. Brian** killed so many bad bills as chair of the that Committee and killed other things before they ever happened. He did so much good for Hunters in that position.

Losing that chairmanship can't be understated. We are going to start to feel the pain of losing the Chairmanship of that Committee. We had a chance to get a friendly Democrat as chair in Representative **Debra**Lekanoff, who is an Alaska Native American, an avid hunter and fisher, but the Democrats selected an anti-hunter, animal-rights person in Representative Mike Chapman to that Chairmanship. That now means both the state House and the Senate Natural Resources Committees will be chaired by animal-rights friendly people.

On the Senate side our good friend Mark Schoesler stepped down from his role as Republican Leader. As Republican Leader it was such a big bonus to have someone who understood our issues to lead the Republican caucus. He, like Blake and Takko, was an initial inductee to the HHC Hall of Fame and an initial winner of WWC's Conservation Honorary Lifetime Member Award, and like Blake and Takko, he was a "Legislator of the Year," every year that I have been President. Senator Schoesler is an avid waterfowl hunter, and I want to thank him for all that he has done for us in leadership and look forward to continuing to work with him. He has helped WWA when we have gone to Olympia, and he is gracious with his time. He is a champion of the hunting community, a superhero, a man of impeccable character, and a good friend.

There was no net gain by either party in the Legislature, but the loss of incumbent Representative Luanne Van Werven to an extremely anti-hunting Democrat in Alicia Rule especially hurt. Rule was on the Blaine City Council and tried to push through a no-shooting zone that would have eliminated waterfowl hunting in Drayton Harbor. A coalition of groups including, including WWA, came to the Whatcom County Commissioners to defeat this draconian proposal. Unfortunately having Alicia Rule in the Legislature is just one more anti-hunting voice.

Still Time to Voice Your Preference for the WDFW Commission

Finally, I want to talk about the Governor's two Recent appointments to the **Fish and Wildlife Commission**. These two (2) were in violation of RCW 77.04.040!

- When Bob Kehoe was removed from the Commission, he was not replaced with a person from the commercial fishing industry, which was Kehoe's main constituency. Now they have no representation on the Commission. This is in violation of RCW 77.04.040.
- 2. The hunting community was not sought out for our recommendation on these two (2) appointments, also in violation of RCW 77.04.040.
- By appointing two more animal-rights/environmental minded Commissioners it throws the Commission out of balance, again in violation of RCW 77.04.040.
- 4. RCW 77.04.040 was put in place to keep balance on the Commission, so all Washingtonians have a fair shot at enjoying the outdoors. The Commission is the citizens' representation on wildlife management.

Rylan is an avid hunter and fisher, and not just waterfowl but also big game, turkey, and upland birds. His personal background gives him unique personal knowledge of both sides of the Cascades. 

Limited Brant Season in Skagit County

OLYMPIA -- The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) today announced continuing hunts in Clallam, Pacific, and Whatcom counties and a three-day hunting season for brant geese in Skagit County.

Continued stable winter counts of brant have allowed for continued hunting opportunities in

- Clallam and Whatcom counties -- Jan.16, 20, and 23; and in
- Pacific County -- Jan. 9, 10, 12, 14, 16, 17, 19, 21, 23, 24, 26, 28, 30 and 31.

Reduced brant counts in **Skagit County** mean that hunters will have a **limited three-day season on <u>January 16, 20, and 23</u>.**

"We conducted aerial brant counts in Skagit County that indicate numbers fell short of our 6,000-bird requirement for an eight-day season," said **Kyle Spragens, WDFW Waterfowl Section Manager.** The reduced schedule is necessary to restrict harvest of western high arctic brant, which primarily overwinter in **Skagit County**. **Spragens** said population surveys conducted in **Skagit County** over **Padilla, Samish,** and **Fidalgo Bays** tallied 3,430 birds, prompted this year's three-day limited season.

"This is the fourth consecutive year of fewer than 6,000 brant in Skagit County bays, and while we strive to provide a harvest opportunity when appropriate, these types of historically low counts require us to prioritize our conservation responsibilities for this iconic coastal waterfowl species, said **Spragens.**

WDFW reminds hunters to familiarize themselves with local regulations and boundaries. Specifically, hunters in Clallam County are advised to consult the closed zones of Dungeness National Wildlife Refuge and hunters in Whatcom County are advised to review boundaries relevant to Bellingham and Lummi Bays.

Brant hunters are reminded they must possess a valid migratory bird authorization and brant harvest report card.
