

Drayton Harbor No Shooting Proposal Will Next Be Heard Sept 14th

Unfortunately a decision by the **Whatcom County Council** regarding a proposed No Shooting Zone in **Drayton Harbor** in **Whatcom County (Agenda Identification Item Number — AB2021-185)** continues to languish.

- previously kicked down the road from the original May 18, 2021 public hearing
- was further kicked down the road at its June 1, 2021 Council meeting;
- was further kicked down the road at its June 15, 2021 meeting last night;
- was further kicked down the road at its July 27, 2021 meeting last night; and
- was not even discussed at the August, 10, 2021 regular scheduled Council meeting.

From the **Council's Action Summary** of the **July 27th Council Meeting, See Page 7** (linked here):

Simply reported as "WITHDRAWN"

Reliable sources have told me that any continued action by the Council is contingent upon a meeting between representatives of the **Whatcom County Council**, the **Blaine City Council**, and the **Lummi Indian Business Council** to see if all parties can get on the same page regarding a compromise in the form of a 1,000 foot No Shooting Setback from shore. The lack of such a meeting happening in early August is the reason for no discussion on the August 10th regularly scheduled County Council Meeting.

The next regularly scheduled County Council Meeting is Tuesday, September 14, 2021.

Sea duck hunting by BOAT is the primary hunting protocol in **Drayton Harbor** that takes place over a half a mile from any beach or city boundary. This type of hunting is seasonal from early December to late January.


Kile Jones Sweeps both WA Duck and Goose Calling Titles

Get Ready for Early Goose Season

Hard to believe but early Goose season is just around the corner. For hunters looking to squeeze the trigger on some locked-up Canadas before the general opener, focus on key tactics for success.

Most of the birds are local residents and not migrators, so different strategies for these early birds are in play. Scouting out areas before it's time to place the decoys is critical. Many of these birds use the same daily patterns. Find the food. Since we can't hunt the golf course or city and county parks:

- Study the fields where geese forage, especially the fields that are planted with small grains.
- Talk to landowners or friends that know landowners to gain access to the fields.
- Early season usually means smaller groups of Geese so, smaller decoy spreads that are well placed are more realistic.
- Camo up yourself, your blinds and your gear. Take advantage of the natural camo at each location.

There may be young birds in these resident flocks, but there are always those weary adults. It only takes one to de-commit the flock. Get ahead of the game and ready for opening day.

New Blinds at the Samish Unit



Building a solid foundation for the High Rise Blind.



The **NW Chapter** constructed two new Hunting Blinds at the **Skagit Wildlife Area Samish Unit.** On July 24, 18 **WWA** members and non-members participated in the construction of five (5) new hunting blinds. We had previously met with **Greg Meis, Assistant Manager** of the **Skagit Wildlife Area** to scope out locations for each new blind. We also did an assessment of necessary repairs on existing blinds.

The blinds all were constructed with treated 2 x 4 and plywood bases with a few raised on 4 x 4's in wetter areas. T-Post construction was used to secure welded metal fencing. We used hedge trimmers to cut 3 truck loads of canary Grass to camo out the blinds. Initial construction was completed on all five (5) blinds.

On August 7th, **WWA** members again met to finish the blinds and complete repairs on existing blinds. The team cut six (6) truck loads of *Canary Grass* and finished grassing up all the new blinds. Six foot long benches were constructed and installed in each blind.

On to the existing blinds... We repaired benches, added T-posts to several blinds, installed welded metal fencing on a old **Boy Scout** built blind, and brushed it up for the season opener.

Handicap Blinds Delivered from Vancouver

Shillapoo Wildlife Area Update

Al O'Conner presented an opportunity to help with habitat enhancement in the Shillapoo State Wildlife Area. Over time Himalayan blackberry vines have over taken segments of the hunt area. The proposal is to hire a contractor to treat and kill the vines in a targeted portion of the hunt area. We voted to provide funds and a contractor for that work at a cost of \$1500 pending verification of the area to be treated in the hunt area at our July meeting.

Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) Update

Ridgefield Refuge Complex Manager Juliette Fernandez provided updates for the hunt program for this fall on a virtual meeting, August 10th.

- The tough news: Only lottery picks will populate the blinds for the morning hunt start.
- The good news: Blinds will be filled as they become available beginning at 10 am.

Ridgefield NWR Special Hunt News

- 1. Lottery submissions for blinds will be accepted from August 16th through September 13th.
- 2. The Youth-Only hunt is scheduled for Saturday, October 30 this year.
- 3. The Veteran's hunt is scheduled on the Veteran's national holiday, Thursday, November 11.

Also, the new lottery vender has not been approved as the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) is going to vet and qualify a new list of venders this year for next year's hunt season. The regional refuges currently using their current vendors were grandfathered in, but no new agreements are being approved.

Rich Hannan has been surveying the blinds again this year for **WWA** and will have a blind report soon. By: Doug Hargin Preliminary reports are the blinds are in good shape, and the mowing has been done in a manner to keep the blinds hidden. We may plan a work party pending any work to be done. Julietta has agreed to speak at our September 30th meeting.

WA Legislative Report

Editor's Note: This article is written entirely by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington. The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter because of WWA's membership in Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

What a Surprise. I'm talking about the WDFW Commission. Again.

I've said this over and over again, we need good, qualified Commissioners that represent hunters and fishers on the **Fish and Wildlife Commission**. Think about it this way, the WA Legislature is in session for 105 days during the odd-numbered years and 60 days during the even-numbered years. The **Fish and Wildlife Commission** meets 11 times every year. The nuts and bolts of wildlife management is done through the Commission. Yes, the Legislature is the Commission's boss, but normally the Legislature gives the direction and allows the Commission to adopt the rule[s].

This is why it is of the utmost importance to get good people on the Commission. The two (2) most recently appointed Commissioners are as anti-hunting as they come. I am going to repeat the statutory balance doctrine:

RCW 77.04.040

Commission—Qualifications of members.

Persons eligible for appointment as members of the commission shall have general knowledge of the habits and distribution of fish and wildlife and shall not hold another state, county, or municipal elective or appointive office. In making these appointments, the governor shall seek to maintain a balance reflecting all aspects of fish and wildlife, including representation recommended by organized groups representing sportfishers, commercial fishers, hunters, private landowners, and environmentalists. Persons eligible for

appointment as fish and wildlife commissioners shall comply with the provisions of chapters 42.52 and * 42.17 RCW.

We do have the RCW on our side. The Commission is out of balance on the radical environmentalists/animal-rights (A/R) side, and it needs to be brought back into balance to the people who pay the freight for the Department. I am going to change course from my usual message and focus on how to write your message to the Governor or any elected official.

First of all, if you have already sent in a message about your choice for certain Commission position, <u>DO NOT</u> send multiple messages. If you do, it will nullify your previous message and none of your messages will count. I have worked in a legislative office and a Congressional office, and tallying responses is a miserable job. The Governor's Office takes your response seriously, as do other elected officials, the poor person that has to bundle those survey responses so the elected official can read them has a really boring job. I know. As an intern in Olympia in 1980 making \$50 a week I tallied surveys, and we counted every response, not just those we agreed with.

Most importantly, be polite. Don't call the Governor an animal-rights extremist. Don't threaten him by saying that if he doesn't appoint your person to the Commission, you won't vote for him. Be professional. Outline the reasons why your person is the best person to be on the Commission. You can argue the Commission is out of balance per RCW 77.04.040, but do it in a polite and professional way. Don't call the Governor's office and harass the Governor's staff and be like the animal-right's people. They do that kind of crazy stuff. Our side has to be better than their side. I get death threats all the time from the animal-rights people. Be polite. Don't ever give the Governor a reason for not considering our side because we looked like a bunch of clowns!

If you haven't submitted your comments on who you want on the Commission, please do so immediately. If you haven't submitted your choice on who you want on the Commission and you don't submit a choice, then don't complain about lack of hunting and fishing opportunities. Don't complain about how **WDFW** is run. Your **WWA**Officers and Directors, the HHC, the WWC, and a lot of groups are fighting hard, because we all see the big picture.

If you can't take five to 10 minutes to write a positive, constructive message on who you want to see on the Commission, then you get what you deserve!

If you have not already expressed your opinion to **Governor Jay Inslee** about your choice for filling the final two (2) appointments to the **Fish and Wildlife Commission**, please do so. Washington Sportsmen/women need to keep the pressure on by demonstrating your preference of **Rylan Weythman** for appointment to the **Commission**.

Rylan is an avid hunter and fisher, and not just waterfowl but also big game, turkey, and upland birds. His personal background gives him unique personal knowledge of both sides of the Cascades. He and his wife **Sara**, a school teacher, currently reside in **Okanogan County**, after spending the better part of the last 10 years in **King County**.

He was raised and schooled near **Wenatchee** -- specifically **Cashmere** – where he spent most of his summers (and more) fishing for salmon on the nearby **Columbia River**. He left **Cashmere** to go to college and law school in California. In 2012 he returned to Washington and is currently a Partner at the prominent law firm of **Foster Garvey**, where he is a litigation attorney.

Support one of our own. Support someone who has sat in the same blinds, glassed the same clear cuts, fished the same holes, and who shares the same core values as you and the Washington Hunting and Fishing Community.

Keep **Rylan's** name in the forefront of public discussion regarding future appointments to the **Commission**. Take a few moments to express your continuing support of **Rylan** to the **Fish** and **Wildlife Commission** using the following **WA State Government Portal** linked **here**.

The Mission:

WDFW Hunter Education Returns In-Person, Hybrid Options Available

WDFW News Release August 11, 2021

OLYMPIA — Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) hunter education classes resume in-person this month. WDFW will begin to offer in-person hunter education classes on August 14, with options for full in-person and hybrid courses.

"While the in-person and hybrid class formats are beneficial for all students, we highly recommend in-person instruction for students under 12," said **Dave Whipple**, **WDFW Hunter Education Manager**. "These courses reinforce important firearm and hunting safety principles, hunting ethics, basic survival and first aid, wildlife identification and conservation. We are excited to begin offering these classes in person with **COVID** restrictions."

Participants can sign up for classes on **WDFW's Hunter Education Page** linked here. Some classes may change based on availability and COVID-related restrictions.
To help meet public demand, an online course is still available for students who must be at least 9-years-old. "Consistent with **WA Department of Health** requirements, students and parents who are not fully vaccinated must wear a mask while indoors," added **Whipple.** "All our volunteer instructors are also required to follow state COVID safety protocols.

To learn about hunter education requirements, course options, or find a course, new hunters should visit the **WDFW hunter education webpage**.

All hunters must pass a hunter education safety course before hunting on their own. Washington honors all 50 states hunter education certifications. Those who are unable to complete a hunter education course before the fall hunting seasons may qualify for a hunter education deferral.

WDFW Commission Approves Operating Budget Requests for Supplemental 2022 Legislative Session August 11, 2021

OLYMPIA The **WDFW Commission** at their August 6th meeting determined which funding and legislation requests the **Department** will submit for consideration by the Legislature during the 2022 legislative session.

The Commission authorized **WDFW** to request \$8.9 million in maintenance funding needs, plus \$9 million in emerging needs and \$4 million in expenditure authority of dedicated accounts. If funded, these requests will help the department to: increase freshwater, forage fish, crab, and game monitoring; improve hatchery safeguards; support salmon data analysis; advance bighorn sheep and mountain goat management; increase capacity to consult on projects related to solar infrastructure, salmon habitat, and fish passage; and respond to increased public use of **WDFW**-managed water access sites and wildlife areas.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH DUCK SLIDERS

INGREDIENTS • 2 T cider vinegar

- 2 I cluci vinegai
- 1.5 to 2# duck breast meat
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp chile powder
- 1/2 tsp garlic powder
- 3 T vegetable oil
- 2 C ketchup
- 1/4 C brown sugar

- 2 T soy sauce
- 4 Chipotle Peppers in adobo Sauce
- 2 T adobo Sauce
- 1 C diced onion
- 4 C onion strips
- · 20 slider buns

DIRECTIONS

- Butterfly duck breasts and gently flatten to 1/8 inch with mallet.
- Combine salt, pepper, chili powder and garlic powder. Sprinkle seasoning mix on both sides of duck breasts.
- Heat vegetable oil in large sauté pan over high heat. Pan-fry duck 5 minutes on each side, until well browned.
- In small stainless steel bowl, combine ketchup, brown sugar, cider vinegar, soy sauce, peppers, adobo and diced onion. Purée until onions and chipotles are fine mince. Heat sauce gradually in small saucepan over low heat.
- 5. Thin slice duck. Add barbecue sauce and mix well. Heat duck until it reaches internal temperature of 160°F.
- 6. Deep-fry onion strips in 350°F fryer for 4 to 5 minutes. Drain well.
- 7. Place ½ cup of duck on each bun. Spread 2 tablespoons fried onions over duck. Cover with top of bun and serve.

- Goose and duck nest counts and banding of both with the WDFW and USFWS
- Working with the WDFW on dove counts & planting WDFW food plots in Eastern WA with WWA owned tractor and farming implements
- Sponsoring of the Annual NW Decoy Collector's Show
- Participating in multiple Sportsman's shows annually
- Donation of funds and volunteer man hours for Swan Mortality Mitigation Studies
- Donation of funds and man hours to WDFW for goose banding and satellite tracking
- Litter pickup projects at public hunting areas, boat ramps, and along highways; and conducting multiple fund raising banquets annually to pay for all of these "hands on" conservation projects.
