



Pittman-Robertson Act Under Attack

Georgia Congressman Andrew Clyde has proposed legislation that would essentially rescind the 85-year-old Pittman-Robertson Act, also known as the Wildlife **Restoration Act**. The act directs taxes collected on firearm sales and ammunition back to the states for habitat protection and wildlife management. The act also contains guidelines that prevent states from diverting the money into other areas, intentionally or otherwise.

The Congressman's intention is to head off current attempts to add excise taxes on specific firearms to make them financially unobtainable. While the idea may have merit on the surface, it does not seem prudent to dismantle a proven funding mechanism for conservation that the protection this new bill is attempting to provide.

Oregon Duck Hunters Association Folds

LC Chapter member, Arlan Hackett attended the final meeting of the Oregon Duck Hunters Assn., (ODH) on July 9th to close up and shutter the organization. He was hoping to get a plug in for WWA and maybe a contact list to offer up an alternative organization for those interested. The **President of ODH** mentioned **Arlan** and **WWA** at the meeting, which unfortunately resulted in only one inquiry and email thus far. No list yet however.

The 52-year-old Minnesota Waterfowl Assn., dissolved in September of 2019. See article linked here.

Ridgefield NWR Black Box Work Party

Still pursuing a future work party to prep the **Black** Box Pit Blinds for installation and build dog boxes. Stay tuned!

Grant Application

As mentioned last month our chapter has applied for a Covid Relief grant being distributed by Clark County to small businesses, nonprofits and community-serving organizations. The grants are part of a state and local economic recovery program funding included in the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 to help with the monetary effects of **Covid-19**. As a non-profit, we have not been able to hold our annual fund-raising banquet the last two years because of Covid. The awarding of the grants has now been delayed until July 22nd. Another stay tuned.

E. Coli Found in Vancouver Lake; By: Doug Hargin Cancels U.S. Rowing Event

VANCOUVER, Wash. — Public health officials say they've found a dangerous bacteria in Vancouver Lake in June, KATU reports. Clark County Public Health says "four of six water samples showed elevated levels of E. coli bacteria." Officials have closed the lake to public swimming and wading, and they issued an advisory for **Battle Ground Lake.**

"We advise against swimming and wading, especially for young children who are more likely to accidentally swallow water. Those who have contact with the water should rinse off after," according to a Facebook post. "People can continue to fish at both lakes but should thoroughly clean and cook fish and wash hands with soap and water."

The announcement has led to the cancellation of the U.S. Rowing Northwest Masters Regional Championship, which was scheduled to take place at Vancouver Lake. Over 1,600 people from across the Pacific Northwest, California, and even Canada were expected to attend, according to organizers. But with no event, it means no boost for local business.


The championship is a three-day event. That's three (3) days of missed opportunities to make profit from people dining, recreating and lodging.

"E. coli kind of came out of left field, canceled the event. This event was going to have a thousand athletes," Kyle Crebar, the operations manager for the Portland-Vancouver Rowing Association, told reporters.

"We definitely see the impacts, see the ripple. When we canceled the event, we had hotels calling us up going, 'what the heck is going on? We have these large blocks of hotel rooms that are all of a sudden being Canceled.' Our vendors that come and participate — everyone is feeling it this year, again," said Crebar.

Organizers say rescheduling the three-day event may be unlikely, but they might try again in 2023.

2022 Goose Banding & Avian Influenza

Maybe you haven't heard, but the **Washington Department of Fish** and **Wildlife (WDFW)** successfully captured and banded western Canada geese in Washington during June and July 2022. Why didn't you hear? We were still dealing with restrictions and complications in using volunteers due to *Covid 19*, and more directly, the **Avian Influenza (AI)** outbreak.

Avian Influenza was

disruptive in several ways, most notably when we started banding, and how we handled birds with the elimination of vent sexing. We only aged birds, applied a band, and released. Al also required the use of hand and boot washing stations, and restricting participation to staff and a few select volunteers to minimize the risk of transmission from site to site, and home poultry flocks.

Even with those complications, we successfully conducted roundups around Yakima, Moses Lake to Electric City, the Columbia River from Vantage to Lake Chelan, the Spokane area north to Newport, as well as Bellingham and the lower Columbia River.

In total we put out over 1,200 new bands and nearly 60 recaptures of birds banded in previous years.

Please remember to report any waterfowl bands and collars to <u>reportband.gov</u> so we can update our distribution maps and survival estimates.

WA Legislative Report

WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

These are the Times that try Men's Souls

"The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands by it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered..."

In the April 2022 Legislative Report, I urged Washington hunters to get involved in state politics. Now, I am making the recommendation on who to support. The ballots drop in July. I am going to take and reuse the same quotes from **HHC Hall of Fame** member **Brian Blake** from that April 2022 story:

"The entire house is up this year and half the Senate," notes **Brian Blake.** "Every seat matters."

Blake foresees another wave election building this fall and advises sportsmen to harness it.

"Hunters should be door-belling for candidates and marching in parades with candidates. Work to elect legislators who can stop the anti-hunting agenda," he says.

A Democrat and multi-year **HHC Legislator of the Year), Blake** was a backstop in Olympia on hunting as well as gun laws (he's an **NRA Life Endowment** member).

"Majorities matter. I am no longer there to protect our heritage," **Blake** states. "Hunters/conservationists need to work for the future of our heritage or not. It is their call."

"Hunters have one chance. Will they get out on the ground and work for pro-hunting/ conservation candidates from August through the election?" **Blake** asks. "Elections and hunting season happen simultaneously and hunters need to participate in both if we are to retain our heritage."

This brings me back to my main point. Hunters need to get involved with electioneering. We all need to get involved this fall and work for pro-hunting candidates. Whether you doorbell for them; make phone calls for them; or send them a contribution — please help them in some way!

If you are an outstanding graphic artist, have special press skills, or have outstanding fundraising skills, pro-hunting candidates can use your "Talent," the second "T."

Finally, pro-hunting candidates need money, a lot of it, to win their races, they need your "Treasure," the third "T." As **Brian Blake** said, every seat matters and this should be a wave election. We should fair very well this election. Get involved. Re-read the **Blake** quotes.

One race in particular EVERY waterfowl hunter should be interested in is the 42nd legislative district, Position 1, Tawsha Thompson, running against Alicia Rule. When Alicia was on the Blaine City Council, she was one of the prime supporters of the proposed Drayton Harbor No-Shooting Ordinance. Waterfowl hunters need to be backing Tawsha with everything we have. In that same district, Position 2, Kyle Christensen is a hunter and is running against a real Anti and deserves our support.

A Tale of Two Covids

I Got Knocked on my Tail End Covid Coughs and More...

On the 29th of June,

This story is not of my normal ilk. It has nothing to do with politics. it has nothing to do with the **WDFW** or its **Commission**, or me criticizing anybody in one of those entities. I got **COVID**,

Editor's Note: After some 30 months of **Covid,** it has finally stricken two members of the **WWA** leadership team and their wives. One couple was vaccinated; the other couple was not.

Thank you both for sharing your personal experiences, thoughts, and opinions with our membership.

my wife Marsha and I set sail, albeit aboard a 757, to our favorite vacation destination, St John Island in the U.S. Virgin Islands. St John is quiet with wonderful,

and quite frankly, I got knocked on my tail end.

An important fact to start this story is that neither my wife nor I received any of the vaccinations. My wife contracted *COVID* first, and I did the best I could to take care of her. She had a horrible cough, and she was blowing out just nasty stuff. She couldn't get out bed and within three (3) days I had the *COVID*. We both tested positive via a home test kit.

When it hit me, it hammered me far harder than it did my wife. I was flat out on my back. I had a 102+ temperature. I could not get up and do anything, but my basic computer work. My headaches were debilitating. I was blowing out green nasty all day long. My lungs hurt. Everything was congested. I had no appetite. I felt like I wanted to die I was so sick. The muscle aches and pains were out of this this world, my legs didn't want to take me anywhere. The cough was hoarse, deep, hacking, and just terrible.

I tried to beat this stuff over-the-counter (OTC), but I wasn't getting any better. I was told to go to the ER room because of my risk factors — I am of advanced age. I am diabetic. I have had a heart attack. I have severe sleep Apnea. I have breathing issues, and I have a rare form of epilepsy. The ER diagnosis confirmed that I had COVID, and I was past where other people could contract it from me.

I was in there for what seemed forever and they ran a huge battery of tests. They put me monitoring program because of my risk factors. I have to report electronically at 10 AM and 4 PM every day — more often if my symptoms are bad. I waited too long when I went to the **ER** where they could use steroid treatments, so I had to go back home continue to use the **OTC** treatments.

I have been back home, and I am still on my back. This **COVID** is still kicking my hind end and it has been over two (2) weeks. I still have headaches. My congestion is still

secluded beaches and much opportunity for communing with nature, both in and out of the water. This island also has a very tragic but interesting history.

Bleary-eyed from the red-eye flight, we landed on **St Thomas** and spent a night recuperating at the **Lindberg Hotel** before catching a 9:00 a.m. ferry to **St John**, which has neither airport nor cruise ship harbor. We planned to snorkel at **Maho Bay, Marsha's** favorite, the next morning.

However I woke up with a stuffy nose, sore throat, and mild fever, and it was raining. Since the weather wasn't cooperating anyway, I spent the day recuperating in bed while drinking lots of fluids (not the good stuff, unfortunately, just aqua). The next day I felt better, but the rain was still pouring down, so I slept in again.

Finally, on the third day, I felt like getting out and took **Marsha** to **Maho** where she saw lots of her favorite sea creatures — green sea turtles. I got wet as it was hot, but didn't feel like snorkeling. The next day I finally felt good enough to snorkel, and we went to a place called **Haulover Bay** where we often see squid. No squid that day but lots of yellow tangs, parrotfish, and much beauty.

Upon getting back to the beach I realized that my left ear was still plugged. This is a common occurrence when I snorkel as my *eustachian tubes* are small and hard to clear, so I didn't think much of it. The next day I snorkeled again and spent 1 ½ hours on a paddleboard, making my way from **Maho** to **Francis Bay** and back; the only thing at Francis Bay was a deer!

When we got home, Marsha went to Kaiser and tested positive for *COVID*, though she's had no symptoms. I'm fine except that my left ear is still plugged and totally useless. I don't even think I could hear a shotgun with that ear. Hopefully, my ear will come back in time (I hope!). I've not tested, but am sure what I've got is a mild case of *COVID*. If Marsha is positive, I must be also.

terrible, and the body aches are still miserable. Using a device at night like a *Naväge* helps, but the next morning you're at square one. I am still weak as hell and my energy level is at zero.

Some of you may have had **COVID** and may be thinking I am being far too melodramatic, or that I am over-reacting. You may believe that COVID isn't that bad. I can say to you — "you may be a lot younger than I am and you may be lucky enough not to have the health issues that I have, but I say don't judge someone until you walk in their boots."

If you haven't had it, I am telling you point blank range, **COVID** is some pretty nasty stuff, it plain kicks your butt. The headaches, the congestion, the cough, the body pain, the weakness — it is downright terrible.

SPOKANE — A 9-year-old girl who was attacked by a cougar on May 28th in northeast Washington is out of the hospital and facing her fears. The girl, Lily Kryzhanivskyy, was playing hide and seek near Fruitland, WA when a cougar pounced on her sending her to the hospital where she received more than 400 stiches.

On June 13, Lily headed out to Seattle for facial nerve surgery for her left eye, which is still not opening all the way. However, her family says this isn't going to be a concern for her recovery.

Less than a month after the attack young Lily joined Bart George, a Kalispel Tribal biologist, on a cougar capture in NE Washington. George, wildlife specialist Jeff Flood, and houndsman Bruce Duncan had been in touch with Lily's family and invited Lily to accompany them to remove the collar from a cougar they had been studying.

"As you can see from the photo, **Lily** has faced any fears she may have had, head-on, and had a fantastic experience doing so," Stevens County Sheriff Brad A. Manke said in a statement.

The capture was part of **George's** multi-year study looking at the most effective ways to scare cougars away from humans, aiming to keep cougars from being habituated to humans and livestock. In the study, cougars are collared, released and then tracked further with hounds. Cougars are not killed in the study.

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The Hunter's Table

Duck Carne Asada with Creamy Chipotle Sauce

After making tacos *al pastor* at home, I decided I really wanted to try to find a really good recipe to use to make street tacos with duck breast. The duck *en mole* is a great option for low and slow cooking, but this is better suited for legs, and I really wanted to make something with some glorious medium-rare duck breast. Of course, the most obvious option is to make *carne asada*.

I made this recipe with both skin on and skinless duck breast. I preferred the skinless version especially since
I cooked this on my grill. There are other recipes that do more justice for the delicious skin that I just couldn't achieve with this one.

This recipe is a great starting point. You can serve it
as street tacos or as burrito filling. I also had it sliced and
placed over the sauce with Spanish rice, and refried beans.

Ingredients

- 3 whole dried ancho chiles
- 3 whole dried guajillo chiles
- 2 whole chipotle peppers in adobo + 1 pepper for the sauce
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 2 Tbsp lime juice
- 2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 2 Tbsp soy sauce
- 2 Tbsp Asian fish sauce
- 2 Tbsp brown sugar
- 1 Bunch of cilantro (stems removed)
- 6 cloves garlic
- 1 Tbsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp ground coriander
- Kosher salt
- 4-6 Duck breast (I prefer boneless skinless)
- 8 oz heavy cream
- Remove the stem and seeds from the chiles
- Toast the chiles in a pan over medium-high until they are puffy, pliant, and fragrant, about 2-3 minutes, turning frequently
- Add the chiles, 2 chipotle peppers, orange juice, lime juice, olive oil, soy sauce, fish sauce, brown sugar, cilantro, garlic, cumin and coriander to a blender
- Blend until smooth

- Add salt to taste (salt it, blend it, taste it. You definitely want to be able to tell it is a little salty)
- Place your duck breasts in a large plastic bag and pour in about half the sauce (you want a healthy amount of the marinade covering each piece)
- Close the bag and mix the meat and marinade around making sure each piece is well coated
- Put the bag in the refrigerator and let it marinate for at least 2 hours, preferably, 4 to 12 hours
- Once you have finished marinating the meat, heat a heavy pan over medium-high to high or heat your grill on high
- Remove the breasts from the marinade, letting the excess drip off
- Cook the breasts about 4 minutes a side for larger ducks like mallards, less for smaller ducks (you want the meat medium rare, 130-140 degrees internal temp)
- Set the duck aside to rest
- Dice the remaining chipotle pepper
- Add the heavy cream, diced chipotle, and ¼ cup of the marinade you set aside, to a pan (or the same pan you cooked the duck in, but let it cool slightly first)
- Heat over medium heat, stirring frequently until it has thickened slightly.
- Remove from heat, slice the duck
- You can serve this as just the duck with sauce and a side
 of rice a beans, chopped up for street tacos or burritos.
 You should have marinade left that can be used as a
 salsa instead of /or in addition to the chipotle cream
 sauce.

The "Return Act" Guts Pittman-Robertson & Wildlife Conservation

From Howl for Wildlife

The Good

When unregulated market hunting nearly decimated North America's big game species in the lead up to the 20th century, it was the forward-thinking efforts of American sportsmen and women that ultimately righted the ship and brought many of our nearly depleted game populations surging back to life.

In 1937, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt spurred on by a host of legendary conservationists [Theodore Roosevelt, John F. Lacey, George Bird Grinnell, and Aldo Leopold, just to name a few] working in both the private and the public sector — enacted a piece of legislation known as the Pittman-Robertson Act or the Wildlife Restoration Act of 1937.

This revolutionary act of Congress redirected already existing excise taxes on firearms and ammunition out of federal coffers and into the hands of the state wildlife agencies tasked with protecting and preserving America's wildlife for the benefit of future generations. As its alternate name suggests, it restored wildlife populations that had been completely pilfered and ensured the continued existence of these species for generations to come.

In the years since, Pittman-Robertson funds have become the lifeblood of American conservation. The money comes not just from firearm and ammo sales but also from similar taxes on archery equipment, fishing tackle, and boat fuel. According to the Department of the Interior, Pittman-**Robertson** generated nearly \$1 billion in 2020 alone. The success of **Pittman-Roberston** and the important funding that it has produced in the 85 years since it was passed is cause for celebration, but it is also something that hunters, anglers, and conservationists around the world must fight to safeguard and protect.

The Bad

Last week, Pittman-Robertson was directly attacked by a Georgia Congressman named Andrew Clyde and 58 of his Republican congressional colleagues. This attack took the form of a bill that Clyde introduced to the U.S. House of Representatives, one that the north Georgia politician

hopes will "eliminate the excise tax on firearms and ammunition" as well as archery equipment and fishing supplies. In so doing, Clyde's bill would decimate the critical funds that make hunting and fishing possible in the United July 6, 2022 States. He says he'd make up for the staggering losses that his bill would bring about (again, \$1 billion in revenue from Pittman-Robertson in 2020 alone) by pulling from the pool of federal tax revenue that comes from offshore oil and gas drilling.

> Clyde, who owns two Georgia gun stores and contracts with the federal government and many state governments for the sale of guns and ammo, says the Pittman-Robertson excise taxes that keep America's hunting and fishing heritage alive are an infringement on constitutional rights. In a recent press release about his act, which he's calling RETURN (Repeal Excise Tax on Unalienable Rights Now) our Constitutional Rights Act, he calls Pittman-Robertson "a dangerous opportunity for the government to weaponize taxation."

> Hunters, anglers, and conservationists beg to differ. They know that **Pittman-Robertson** represents one of the greatest opportunities for sound wildlife management that the world has ever seen. In an unprecedented time of economic turmoil, it brought together some of the best conservation minds in history and gave America's wildlife a sustainable funding source that continues to thrive today. In our current era of stifling political division, it is hard to imagine a group of politicians coming together to create something so fundamentally important to the continued existence of wildlife in America as was the Pittman-Robertson Act of 1937.

But the unlikely story behind America's wildlife recovery that so many hunters and anglers hold close to their hearts is clearly lost on Georgia Rep. Andrew Clyde and his 58 Republican co-sponsors. By signing their names to this ill-advised piece of legislation, these politicians have made a clear statement — they want to see these critical conservation funds gutted—American wildlife be damned.

Time to Howl

If you disagree with this plan, now is the time to let your Congressman, the House Natural Resources Committee, all 58 Co-Sponsors and Rep. Andrew Clyde (the Author) know about it. To take action, use the line here. Let them know that you won't sit idly by as they attempt to trash the North American Model of Wildlife Conservation with this dangerous political stunt.

RRGC Wood Duck Box Program

Please find pasted below an e-mail ail received yesterday from **Richland Rod & Gun Club (RRGC)** with another Wood Duck Box Camera.

The **WWA** Database system that we are using will tell us if you opened the e-mail and also if you clicked on and opened the link. From this, we know that these e-mails are of high, medium, or low interest to our **WWA** membership.

If you do not have an interest, please just humor us and delete it. This is a group e-mail, and it goes out to all **WWA** members in the system.

We hope you are all well as we hopefully move on after two (2) years of Covid restrictions, and please stay safe.

Nine (9) ducklings "jump" from RRGC Box 367 when Hen 1265-14802 calls for them to exit at about 6:49 am on June 27, 2022 — (Video linked here).

A recording of the "jump" that 16 ducklings made from RRGC Box 518 when Hen 1265-14778 calls for them to exit at 9:30 am on June 18, 2022. (Video linked here).

Wood Ducks and a few screech owls are currently nesting in the 512 boxes. Banding has also taken place and the information will be entered into a database for future tracking. You can check out the live stream cameras at www.RRGCWoodDucks.org to see what is currently going on with all of the RRGC nest boxes.





Some History of the RRGC Nesting Box Program

We have accomplished performing the annual maintenance of all 474 nesting boxes that were available for wood ducks last nesting season. We have replaced some of those boxes that have reached the end of their life with boxes built by youth at the **Sportsman Show** or **Kids Duck Day**, and by students at **Libby Middle School** or **Homeschool** students.

The data collected during the effort shows 56.5 % of boxes were used by wood ducks, 86 boxes were used by **Western Screech Owls,** cooperative banding with **WDFW** installed 17 new bands on owls and had 24 owls recaptured having been banded in previous years.

There were 186 nest boxes that had successful hatching of ducklings evidenced by us counting 1214 membranes. We believe this number is a very conservative estimate of the actual number of ducklings that were hatched and jumped from the nest boxes. The reason we feel the number is lower than actual is because many membranes are "lost" between the hatch and when the box cleaning is performed months later.

News Briefs for the Flock

Trophy Hunter Was 'Hunted'

From a Compilation of various World-Wide News Sources July 4, 2022

A wildlife trophy hunter, who had previously posted on social media promoting his business about the hunting and killing of elephants, lions, and other African species, was found shot to death, execution-style, in **South Africa**, according to reports.

Professional Hunter, Riaan Naude, age 55, was found dead next to his vehicle in the South African Province of Limpopo, about three (3) miles from Mokopane on June 8th, according to a report by the Daily Mirror. "The motive for the attack and the subsequent murder is unknown at this stage," according to police.



Naude had previously uploaded images of himself to social media posing with the carcasses of endangered species like lions, elephants, and giraffes that he had killed.

Naude's company Pro Hunt Africa, labeled itself a "Hunting and Eco Safari Outfit."

The group organizes paid hunting trips for customers. Several of **Naude's** clients have been the subject of past exposes' by the group, **TrophyXpose**.

In February, **South Africa's Department of Forestry, Fisheries** and the **Environment** announced an increase in quotas for hunting. Each hunter will be allowed to hunt for 10 leopards, 150 elephants, and 10 black rhinos in 2022. This announcement irritated many wildlife activists in **Africa** and around the world.

According to the Heritage Protection Group (HPG), a non-profit organization that combats crime, Naude pulled his pickup truck off the road about 5 km outside of Mokopane after the vehicle overheated. South Afrcan Police Service said that upon arrival at the scene they found the man's lifeless body on the ground next to the pickup.

"The man was lying with his face up and there was blood on his head and face," according to police.

A patterned shell was found at the scene, but the manufacturer of the firearm has not yet been determined. Preliminary investigation revealed that a cattle keeper nearby heard a gunshot and noticed a white *Nissan* pickup with a trailer speeding away from the crime scene toward Marken. According to eyewitnesses, the white pickup truck stopped next to **Naude** and shot him in cold blood at a short distance. After which two suspects got out and presumably looted just a pistol.

Police found two (2) hunting rifles, ammunition, clothes, water, whiskey and pajamas in the deceased's truck. "It looks like he was on his way to go hunting," according to police.

Great Salt Lake Drought Affects Ducks

Did you know that half of the North American continent's **ruddy ducks** stage at the Great Salt Lake while half of its **redheads** nest here. In all, an estimated 10 million birds from more than 330 species migrate through or live at the lake each year, according to the **National Audubon Society's Saline Lakes Program.** Read he full story, linked here.

WDFW Restricts Activities on Wildlife Areas Jul 14, 2022

SPOKANE – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) will restrict campfires and other activities on WDFW-managed lands in Eastern Washington beginning Friday, July 15, to help reduce the risk of fire on state wildlife and water access areas.

Overall, the emergency order that imposes restrictions east of the Cascades prohibits:

- Fires or campfires, including those in fire rings.
 Personal camp stoves and lanterns fueled by propane, liquid petroleum, or liquid petroleum gas are allowed.
- Discharge of firearms for target shooting or other purposes by anyone not engaged in lawful hunting.
- Smoking, except in an enclosed vehicle.
- Welding and operating chainsaws.
- Operating a motor vehicle away from developed roads
 Parking is permitted within designated parking areas, including developed campgrounds and trailheads and in areas without vegetation that are within 10 feet of roadways.



our website [www.waduck.org].


